Vice-Chair Howerton moved, seconded by Commissioner Reckhow, to approve as submitted the July 28, 2014 Regular Session Minutes and May 30, 2014 Budget Worksession Minutes of the Board.

## Accept the Presentation of an Urban Libraries Council 2014 Top Innovators Award for the Library's First Library in Space Program

Ms. Tammy Baggett, Library Director, introduced Ms. Susan Benton, Urban Libraries Council President and CEO. Ms. Benton gave a brief explanation of how the County's library was selected. Once a year, the Council asked for the most innovative programs to strategically move communities forward. She added that the Durham County library could have received the award in many areas. She congratulated the director and staff on outstanding work, and presented the Top Innovators Award to Ms. Baggett.

Ms. Baggett accepted the award and made brief remarks on the First Library in Space as well as other programs offered by the Library.

Ms. Gina Rozier, Marketing Manager, shared a PowerPoint presentation on the conception of the First Library in Space (FLIS) idea. The Library also developed a documentary, with the help of teens that was shared with the Board and audience.

The Board expressed how proud they were of the innovative library staff and the excellent services provided to the citizens of Durham County. The Board congratulated the team on their efforts, and on receiving the award.

#### **Proclamation – Purple Heart Designation**

Chairman Page read the following proclamation:

**WHEREAS**, the Purple Heart is the oldest decoration in present use and was initially created as the Badge of Military merit by George Washington in 1782; and,

**WHEREAS**, the Purple Heart was the first American service award or decoration made available to the common soldier and is specifically awarded to any member of the United States Armed Services wounded or killed in combat while serving the United States against opposing armed forces; and,

**WHEREAS**, the mission of the Military Order of the Purple Heart, chartered by an act of Congress, is to foster an environment of goodwill among the combat wounded veteran members and their families, promote patriotism, support legislative initiatives and most importantly-make sure we never forget; and,

**WHEREAS**, there have been many Durham County residents who made the ultimate sacrifice for the cause of freedom and many combat wounded Veterans and Purple Heart recipients who live in the County;

**NOW, THEREFORE,** I, Michael D. Page, Chairman of the Durham Board of County Commissioners and on behalf of the Durham Board of County Commissioners do hereby bestow honor and gratitude to all combat-

wounded Veterans and those who have received the Military Order of the Purple Heart, and proudly proclaim Durham County as a

Ms. Lois Harvin-Ravin, Veteran Services Director, stated that Durham County was the last county to become a Purple Heart county in North Carolina. She noted that there had been over 6500 Purple Heart license tags issued across the State of North Carolina.

Ms. Harvin-Ravin introduced Jesse G Torres, Adjutant, Military Order of the Purple Heart. Mr. Torres shared remarks and thanked the Board for considering approving the designation that would culminate all 100 counties in North Carolina as Purple Heart designees. He explained the mission of the Durham Chapter and expounded on some of the accomplishments over the past year.

#### Consent Agenda Item No. k.

#### Durham County Board of Commissioners Resolution

**WHEREAS**, Durham County NC has reviewed the elements of the proposed merger between Comcast and Time Warner Cable and determined that the merger will create a monopoly that poses a grave threat to NC consumers by its ability to control prices, content and availability; and

**WHEREAS**, the concentration of horizontal and vertical aspects of the cable and media business by the merger will grant Comcast unprecedented ability and incentive to engage in anti-competitive behaviors fundamentally harmful to North Carolina residents and businesses; and

**WHEREAS**, the merged Comcast would directly or indirectly control virtually all the North Carolina broadband market and cable TV market as well as limit visual and electronic media content the public can access; and

**WHEREAS**, the likelihood exists that certain types of content will be given special (or worse) treatment based on the provider's financial relationship with the merged entities; and

WHEREAS, consumers face the prospect of higher prices to pay the \$45 billion merger acquisition cost;

**WHEREAS**, North Carolina consumer and business interests are not likely to be protected by the Federal government, but can be protected only by proactive behavior by the North Carolina Attorney General;

**WHEREAS**, the North Carolina Attorney General has authority to launch an investigation into the merger and ascertain the likely effects of the merger upon North Carolinians;

**WHEREAS**, the North Carolina Attorney General could use federal authority to review the financial and consumer aspects of the merger and use that evidence to seek conditions that limit the effects of the merger upon North Carolinians by requiring consumer protections and anti-monopoly guarantees from the merged entity; and

**NOW, THEREFORE**, **BE IT RESOLVED** that the Durham Board of County Commissioners, go on record as being opposed to the proposed Comcast Time Warner Cable merger without adequate consumer protection conditions being placed on the merged entity.

**BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT WE** do hereby call upon the North Carolina Attorney General to review the financial and consumer aspects of the merger and use that evidence to seek conditions that improve the effects of

the merger upon North Carolinians by requiring consumer protections, expansion of cable service to underserved areas, provision of high speed broadband infrastructure to serve our 21st century economy, and antimonopoly guarantees from the merged entity.

# <u>Public Hearing – Unified Development Ordinance Text Amendment, Technical Changes VII (TC 1300001)</u>

The Board was requested to conduct a public hearing and receive public comments on the *Unified Development Ordinance* Text Amendment, Technical Changes VIII (TC1300001).

The Board was also requested to adopt an ordinance amending the *Unified Development Ordinance*, incorporating revisions to Article 2, Review Authority; Article 3, Applications and Permits; Article 4, Zoning Districts; Article 5, Use Regulations; Article 6, District Intensity Standards; Article 7, Design Standards; Article 8, Environmental Protection; Article 9, Landscaping and Buffering; Article 10, Parking and Loading; Article 11, Sign Standards; Article 12, Infrastructure and Public Improvements; Article 13, Additional Requirements for Subdivisions; Article 15, Enforcement; and Article 16, Definitions.

Mr. Michael Stock, Senior Planner, introduced the item. He certified that all advertisements were made in accordance with the statute. Mr. Stock gave a brief explanation of the proposed changes. He indicated that the Planning Commission unanimously recommended approval of the changes on May 13, 2014.

Commissioner Reckhow referenced page 28 of the Ordinance related to swimming pools. She specifically questioned the deletion of the requirements for enclosing private pools with walls or fences. Mr. Stock responded that there were sometimes duplicative or contradictory regulations between the building code and the UDO, so it was determined that the enclosure requirements would be determined through the code.

Commissioner Reckhow expressed safety concerns and recalled a tragedy that resulted in the fencing requirement being added to the UDO. Mr. Steve Medlin, Planning Director, commented that the biggest change was the new requirement for building permits for swimming pools which now require inspections.

Commissioner Reckhow questioned the height requirement for the fence. Mr. Medlin responded that the 5' height was the same as the building code. There was additional discussion regarding opaque requirements to create a noise buffer. Mr. Medlin indicated that he would look at adding some additional language back into the ordinance.

Regarding the form based code, Commissioner Reckhow commented on the new apartment buildings being constructed. Some residents have questioned why the buildings are so close to the street. She commented that depending on the width of the street or sidewalk, the buildings could appear dominating. She opined that there was some merit to having a few extra feet of a planted strip between the street and buildings.

Mr. Stock responded that Planning was currently looking at those issues.

Chairman Page opened the public hearing. As there were no individuals signed up to speak, Chairman Page closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Reckhow moved, seconded by Vice-Chair Howerton, to adopt an ordinance amending the *Unified Development Ordinance*, incorporating revisions to Article 2, Review Authority; Article 3, Applications and Permits; Article 4, Zoning Districts; Article 5, Use Regulations; Article 6, District Intensity Standards; Article 7, Design Standards; Article 8, Environmental Protection; Article 9, Landscaping and Buffering; Article 10, Parking and Loading; Article 11, Sign Standards; Article 12, Infrastructure and Public Improvements; Article 13, Additional Requirements for Subdivisions; Article 15, Enforcement; and Article 16, Definitions.

The motion carried unanimously.

### **Adjournment**

Vice-Chair Howerton moved, seconded by Commissioner Reckhow, to adjourn the Regular Session meeting.
