# 7. Public Hearing - The Community Transportation Program (CTP) Grant Application - Section 5311, FY 2015-2016 (10 min)

- The Board is requested to hold a public hearing on the proposed Federal Section 5311 1) grant application administered by the North Carolina Department of Transportation – Public Transportation Division (NCDOT-PTD). The purpose of the public hearing is twofold: 1) to allow members of the community the opportunity to comment on the application and the County's transportation needs, and 2) to allow the County Board to approve the required attached resolution authorizing the submission of the grant Durham County ACCESS implements the application to the NCDOT-PTD. Community Transportation Program (CTP) for persons who are elderly, have a disability, or are transportation disadvantaged. The Durham County ACCESS program through the Cooperative Extension has applied for 5311 grant funds through the NCDOT-PTD annually since 1999. Former grant requests included funds to purchase vehicles and funds to subsidize the administrative costs associated with delivering the CTP. In September 2014, Durham County ACCESS was notified in a letter from NCDOT-PTD that the State would begin reducing its' participation in the urban portion of Durham County's administrative costs. This change in funding was based on the State's decision to no longer offer the same level of state funding to CT systems that provide human service and general public transportation to individuals living in inside the UZA which is prohibited by the Section 5311 Program. To that end, NCDOT-PTD has begun the reduction in funding the urban portion and has advised Durham County to begin to seek other funding sources allowed for urbanized areas.
- 2) The CTP-5311 grant application requests \$88,735 the maximum level of funding the NCDOT-PTD has agreed to fund. If Durham County is awarded the grant, the NCDOT requires a local match of \$13,310.25 to be appropriated in the FY 15-16 budget and confirmation by Resolution that the revenue from this grant and the expenditures required of the county as local match will be budgeted in the FY 15-16 budget for Coordinated Transportation.

- 3) A total of \$13,310.25 is requested as local match from the County General Fund
- 4) The deadline for submittal of the completed grant application to NCDOT is November 21, 2014.
- 5) Alignment with Strategic Plan: Goal 1 and Goal 2: Provides a portion of the administrative staff's salary. These essential positions are required to manage the demand response transportation program grants and riders. This demand response transportation service provides mobility and access to destinations that enhance the health, economic impact and quality of life for Durham County Residents.

- 8. Public Hearing Unified Development Ordinance Text Amendment, Industrial
  Light (IL) Project Boundary Buffer (TC1400002) (20 min)
- 1) The Board is requested to conduct a public hearing and receive public comments on the *Unified Development Ordinance* Text Amendment, Industrial Light (IL) Project Boundary Buffer (TC1400002); and
- 2) **First Motion:** To adopt the appropriate Statement of Consistency pursuant to North Carolina General Statutes §153A-341; and
- 3) **Second Motion:** To adopt an ordinance amending the *Unified Development Ordinance*, incorporating revisions to Article 9, Landscaping and Buffering.
- 4) Text amendment TC1400002 is a privately-initiated request to reduce the required project boundary buffer required for properties zoned Industrial Light (IL) adjacent to developed properties without a buffer in the Industrial (I) zoning district. The amendment would reduce a potential 100% buffer opacity to 40% opacity, with a corresponding reduction to the buffer width, and limited to properties of four acres or less.

- 7) Planning Commission Recommendation and Vote: Recommended approval, 13-0, on May 13, 2014. The Planning Commission determined that the ordinance request is consistent with the adopted *Comprehensive Plan*, and that the request is reasonable and in the public interest based on comments received at the public hearing and the information in the staff report.
- 8) Alignment with Strategic Plan: The text amendment emphasizes Goal 1 by offering fair and reasonable regulations for the citizens and business community of Durham while adhering to Goal 5 by maintaining a transparent government and welcoming public input.

- 1) The Board is requested to conduct a public hearing on the permanent closing of a 431.99 linear foot portion of Chanticleer Drive, 470.25 linear feet of Hatteras Drive, and 717.21 linear feet of Buxbury Lane.

- 3) Alignment with Strategic Plan: Staff finds the request to align with Goal Five, "Accountable, Efficient and Visionary Government", of the strategic plan. These three streets are presently unused and no longer maintained by North Carolina Department of Transportation. Closing these streets will allow the applicant to develop the underlying land with public benefit.

<u>County Manager's Recommendation</u>: The Manager recommends that the Board hold a public hearing and, if justified, adopt an order permanently closing a 431.99 linear foot portion of Chanticleer Drive, 470.25 linear feet of Hatteras Drive, and 717.21 linear feet of Buxbury Lane.

# 10. <u>Durham County Cooperative Extension Seeks Permission and Support to Submit an Application for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Round Promise Zone Designation Opportunity (20 min)</u>

- 1) The Board is requested to receive a presentation of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Round Promise Zone Designation by Durham Cooperative Extension in partnership with the Congressional Districts of Congressman Price and Butterfield, and staff of Southeast Community Resources (SECR). In October 2014, the Obama Administration launched the competition to designate the next round of Promise Zones. Promise Zones are part of the President's plan to create a new pathway to the middle class by partnering with local communities and businesses to create jobs, increase economic security, improve educational opportunities, and reduce violent crime.
- 2) Durham Extension and its partners have taken the initial steps to complete this application. In an effort to better increase our chances of being the first designated Urban Promise Zone in the southeast we sought and acquired approval for an innovative approach to the required contiguous service area by creating a Regional Promise Zone based on contiguous Congressional Districts. The Durham-Fayetteville Assault on Poverty Promise Zone includes Durham (Durham County) and Fayetteville (Cumberland County).
- 3) Applicants for the 2<sup>nd</sup> Round Promise Zone must be in partnership with local government, encompass one or more census tract (s) or across a contiguous geography, have an overall poverty or low income rates of residents within the Zone at or above 33%, a population of at least 10,000 but no more than 200,000 residents and have the support and commitment of local leadership, including the mayor, and be able to leverage private investment.
- 4) The initial investment for this for the Promise Zone Regional application is \$300,000, to be equally divided between the two counties. Durham Extension is asking for a commitment from Durham County in the amount of \$50,000 with the remainder of the funds coming from local investors. The same is being requested of Cumberland County. This investment of \$300,000 will bring in a minimum of \$5 million dollars to the region.
- Alignment with Strategic Plan: The Promise Zone addresses all five of the goals outlined in Durham County's Strategic Plan: Goal 1: Community and Family Prosperity and Enrichment; Goal 2: Health and Well-being for All; Goal 3: Safe and Secure Community; Goal 4: Environmental Stewardship; and Goal 5: Accountable, Efficient and Visionary Government. In addition to addressing the Goals of Durham County, the Promise Zone also address the Mayor's Poverty Initiative.

<u>County Manager's Recommendation</u>: The County Manager recommends that the Board receives the presentation; approve the submission of an application by Cooperative Extension; give the manager authorization to enter into a MOA; and allocate the financial resources requested.
