<u>15-176</u> Kitchen Floor Replacement at Durham County Detention Center IFB 15-010

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to authorize the County Manager to execute a contract with H.M. Kern Corporation for the Kitchen Floor Replacement at the Durham County Detention Center. The work will include demolition of the existing kitchen quarry tile floor down to the existing slab. The removal and disposal of all construction debris from the site and properly dispose of as required by the City of Durham and Durham County Solid Waste Department. The new concrete floor will be a two part process which includes pouring a 1 3/4" 4000 PSI grout bed then finishes with a 1/4" non-slip epoxy floor covering. The contractor has 30 calendar days to complete the work from the date of Notice to Proceed. There is a liquidation penalty of \$2,100.00 per day based on the cost to feed the inmates per day if the project exceeds the 30 calendar day time frame.

H.M. Kern submitted the low bid which was \$123,000.00 which is \$27,000.00 below the projected budget. General Services reviewed all three (3) submitted bid proposals and recommends that H.M. Kern Corporation be awarded the contract. The final bid tabulation is attached.

Approval of NCDOT and Syngenta Agreements to Facilitate State Support for Syngenta Expansion and Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 15BCC000038 to recognize the additional revenue and off-setting expenditure.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve both attached agreements and an associated Budget Ordinance Amendment 15BCC000038 to facilitate \$350,000 in state (NCDOT) support for Syngenta's Phase II expansion.

As part of Syngenta's most recent expansion in Durham County, the state (through the NC Department of Transportation) agreed to contribute \$350,000 towards roadway improvements required as part of the expansion. County Commissioners were pivotal in securing that assistance, passing a resolution on June 24, 2013 supporting that assistance.

Since NCDOT is prohibited from paying (or contracting with) a private developer directly, the County was needed to act as a pass-through for the \$350,000. Staff endeavored to make a single, three-way agreement contain all of each party's commitments, but in the end two separate agreements were required. The first agreement appears to put the onus of causing the road improvements to be the County's responsibility. The second, however, passes on all of that burden (for constructing the improvements according to NCDOT standards and taking on all related liabilities) to Syngenta. Both agreements have been reviewed and approved by the County Attorney's office.

Durham Open Space and Trails (DOST) Commission Matching Grants Funding Recommendation

Agenda Text:

The Durham Open Space and Trails Commission (DOST) received eight applications for the Matching Grants Program to assist nonprofit community organizations with recreational and open space projects. The Matching Grants committee of the DOST and county staff examined the proposed projects to ensure compliance with the program's goals and guidelines. The DOST approved these six projects and funding recommendation below at its January 21, 2015, meeting:

Budget Ordinance Amendment No.15BCC000039 Appropriating \$150,000 of Public Health Medicaid Cost Settlement Over-collection to Allow the Evaluation and Space Planning for Durham County's EMS Facilities

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 15BCC000039 appropriating \$150,000.00 of over-collected Public Health Medicaid Cost Settlement funds for the Evaluation and Space Planning for Durham County's EMS Facilities.

On April 28, 2014 (FY 13-14), the BOCC approved the Capital Project Amendment No. 14CPA00008 by \$365,000.00 transferring those funds to the EMS Operating Budget in the General Fund (Budget Ordinance Amendment No. 14BC000050) authorizing sole source procurement of Optima Predict Operational Analysis software in the amount of \$215,000.00. The remaining \$150,000.00 was set aside for an evaluation and space planning study allowing the execution of the contract with Moseley Architects previously approved by the BOCC on November 24, 2014. The \$150,000.00 for the space planning was unable to be spent in FY 2013-14 and the unspent funds in turn fell to General Fund Balance. This amendment re-budgets those funds using Public Health Cost Settlement funding for their intended purpose for the 2014-15 fiscal year.

This evaluation and space planning evaluation will incorporate information obtained from the Optima software to evaluate EMS station placement and provide an assessment of the physical conditions of the current EMS facilities in order to determine a long range plan for EMS facilities based on current and future needs.

This project involves the renovation of the former Durham County Judicial Building located at 201 East Main Street, Durham North Carolina following the relocation of the Court Offices/Services, Sheriff's Office and associated agencies to the recently completed Durham County Courthouse. The 141,000 gross square foot, seven-story building of steel frame construction with pre-cast concrete and exterior glass curtain wall façade was built in 1978. The County Facility Master Plan completed in 2000 and amended in 2003 recommends that the building be renovated as an office building for expansion of functions currently housed in the Old Courthouse (Administration Building), Agriculture Building and leased spaces including future growth and expansion. The current building configuration does not meet the needs of the functions intended to be relocated to the building.

A request for qualifications (RFQ) for architectural services for the facility was advertised on June 16, 2013. (See Attachment 1, Pages 7-9). Fifteen responses were received on July 16, 2013 and were evaluated by a selection committee representing

the County Manager's Office, General Services, Information Technology, Library Services and County Engineering (See Attachment 1, Pages 10 & 11). Four firms were interviewed on April 29, 2014 and O'Brien/Atkins Associates, P.A. located in Durham was determined to be the most qualified firm for the Judicial Building Renovation project. On June 23, 2014, the BOCC authorized the County Manager to enter into a contract with OBA to provide programming and pre-design services for the proposed project which has since been completed and presented to the BOCC at the February 2, 2015 work-session.

Following discussions outlining the scope of the project, a fee proposal to provide professional architectural and engineering services for Schematic Design through Post Construction phases of the project was submitted on January 15, 2015 (See Attachment 1, "OBA's proposal" Pages 3-6).

Durham County established the following goals for the expenditure of funds with M/WBEs for this project:

In review of the M/WBE participation, O'Brien/Atkins Associates, P.A. has proposed 7.58% M/WBE participation on this project. OBA has also committed to seeking additional participation if the opportunity prevails.

It is recommended that the County proceed with all work described in the proposal dated January 15, 2015 in the amount of \$2,926,110.00 plus a reimbursable amount of \$200,000.00 thus to totaling a not to exceed budget of \$3,126,110.00.

ALIGNMENT WITH STRATEGIC PLAN: This aligns with Goal #4-Environmental Stewardship - through the improvement of the environmental performance of County buildings to reduce energy use and greenhouse gas emissions from the built environment. The relocation of various departments into this facility also addresses Goal #5 by providing more efficient service delivery and better customer service.

Public Hearing - Resolution of the Durham County Board of County Commissioners Approving the Issuance by the Public Finance Authority of Bonds on Behalf of Contemporary Science Center, Inc.

Agenda Text:

The Board is requested to approve the attached resolution approving issuance by the Public Finance Authority of bonds on behalf of Contemporary Science Center, Inc. (and, by extension, Research Triangle High School).

The Public Finance Authority (the "Authority") is a commission organized under and pursuant to the provisions of Sections 66.0301, 66.0303 and 66.0304 of the Wisconsin Statutes, is authorized to issue tax-exempt, taxable, and tax credit conduit bonds for public and private entities throughout all 50 states and is jointly sponsored by the National Association of Counties and National League of Cities, among others.

Any issuance of bonds by the Authority is required to be approved by the "applicable elected representative" of a governmental unit having jurisdiction over the entire area in which the Facility is located, after a public hearing held following reasonable public notice (this hearing was advertised in the Durham Herald-Sun more than 14 days in advance of tonight).

The bonds in question with this hearing are "Education Revenue Bonds (Triad Educational Services, Inc.) Series 2014 in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$13,000,000 and will be used to (A) finance the acquisition, construction, improvement and/or equipping certain charter school educational facilities for the Borrower known as "Research Triangle High School", including an existing approximately 52,000 square foot, three-story facility located at 3106 NC Hwy 54, Research Triangle Park, NC 27709 that will serve grades 9-12 and approximately 500 students and (B) finance certain other expenditures related to such acquisition, construction, improvement and/or equipping of the Facility; (2) pay certain expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the Bonds; and (3) fund all or a portion of a reserve fund deposit, capitalized interest and related working capital.

These Bonds <u>do not</u> constitute a debt of the State of North Carolina or any political subdivision or any agency thereof, including Durham County. They are payable <u>solely</u> from the revenues and other funds provided for in a loan agreement between the Authority and the Borrower, and accordingly no County taxpayer funds will ever be involved, obligated, due, or paid as a result of the issuance of these bonds.

ALIGNMENT WITH STRATEGIC PLAN: Objective 1 of Goal 1 of the County Strategic Plan is to "provide support for educational opportunities that ensure high academic achievement."
