Executive Summary

The Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has reviewed and updated the County Plan for FY 2018-2019.

The JCPC has identified issues and factors that have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Durham County. Further, the JCPC has identified strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

JCPC Action Plan: An Action Plan to impact delinquent behavior (included in this document) has been developed. With the goals, measurable objectives and corresponding outcomes, the JCPC proposes to: prevent or reduce delinquent behavior in Durham County youth.

Goals:

1. Prevent and reduce delinquent behavior
2. Reduction of complaints
3. Parent involvement
4. Reduction in violations of community supervision
5. Program completion

Major gaps in available service identified by the Durham County JCPC include the development and strengthening of effective and accessible alternatives to suspension programs, gang prevention and intervention programs and programs that increase parental involvement and support. Durham County JCPC is particularly interested in programs that are culturally competent, inclusive and accessible to youth and their families.

Priorities for Funding: Through a risk & needs assessment of Durham County, and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Durham.

FY 2017-2018 Accomplishments

JCPC works to intervene, respond to and treat the needs of juveniles at-risk of delinquency in Durham County. The FY 2017-2018 accomplishments were as follows:

Allocated \$536,666 from the North Carolina Department of Public Safety Division of Adult Correction & Juvenile Justice to fund ten continuation programs serving delinquent and at-risk youth in Durham County for FY 2017-2018.

Each program funded in the past year by JCPC has been monitored for compliance with Program Agreements by examining records documenting sound fiscal and program implementation and client tracking information using NC Allies to ensure an accurate account of services. In addition, JCPC reviewed information related to program evaluation, methods to maintain service fidelity and program improvements efforts and strategies.

The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its Action Plan and its funded programs on a quarterly basis. JCPC also requires funded programs to submit quarterly reports on youth admitted, number of youth served, referral source, referral reason, evidence of program progress and methods on how JCPC can assist the funded program.

Having published a Request for Proposals (RFP) for needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services for Durham County youth. As required by statute, JCPC recommends allocation of \$536,666 for reducing or preventing delinquency and develop strategies to achieve targeted outcomes.

JCPC further recommends that \$12,000 be allocated for the administrative costs of JCPC for FY 2018-2019.

Participated in the 2017 National Night Out Community Cookout hosted by the Beta Phi Chapter of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity. Adults and youth received information about Durham County Teen Court & Restitution Program, Parenting of Adolescents Program,

Represented by members at the 2017-2018 Fall & Spring Conference of the North Carolina Juvenile Services Association (NCJSA).

Community Relations Committee revised the JCPC Brochure FY 2018-2019 and will disseminate the brochures throughout the community informing citizens about JCPC.

Nominating Committee presented a slate of officers for F.Y. 2018-2019.

At each meeting, a JCPC funded program providers presented their program.

Former Judge Marcia Morey was awarded the 2017 Karen K. Thompson Outstanding Service Award in recognition of her outstanding leadership, service & advocacy to prevent & mitigate juvenile delinquency to enhance the lives of youth in Durham County while serving on the Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council. The Karen K. Thompson Outstanding Service Award is named in memory, honor and service of long-time JCPC treasurer and youth advocate Karen K. Thompson, the first recipient of the award. For over 10 years, Karen provided leadership throughout the funding process and helped train new members; she passed on August 21, 2014.

Durham JCPC Let's Talk: A Community Conversation

On June 27, 2018, the Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) hosted Let's Talk: A Community Conversation at the Hayti Heritage Center from 5pm - 8pm. From 5pm – 6pm the seven (7) programs funded by JCPC networked with attendees in the front room. The room was alive with energy as community members conversed with high school students, families, and community stakeholders. Food was also served from 5pm – 6pm.

Our program was from 6pm – 8pm in the Auditorium. Our program was a mix of spoken word and juvenile justice information. Durham County Commissioner Brenda Howerton opened the program and welcomed the audience members. Our program highlighted three dynamic youth performers Ayanna Albertson, Spoken Word; Jerimiah Henderson, Rap Performance; and Monya Jones, Spoken Word. These performances moved the audience to their feet in standing ovations. In between each performer, we gave out updates on the juvenile justice system in Durham. Our chair and host, Nisha G. Williams highlighted all seven JCPC funded programs and recognized their efforts working together and with Durham Public Schools and the Durham County Student Resource Officers. She discussed the desire of JCPC to educate the community on the Raise the Age legislation that will impact the Juvenile Justice office.

Durham County's Chief Court Counselor Tasha Jones Butts presented to the audience necessary information on the impact that the Raise the Age legislation will have on our current youth population as well as the current statistics on how many actual juvenile complaints and juveniles are received in Durham County Juvenile Justice office. Sergeant Andre Hinton spoke to the audience on the work the Student Resource Officers have been doing to work with school system to avoid charging students with a criminal offense, as a result these young people are avoiding entering the criminal justice system by diverting them to our JCPC programs.

A five-person panel facilitated by Donna Rewalt discussed what systems and institutions are doing to address racial inequities and better the lives of young people in Durham County. The panel had representatives from Durham Public Schools, Dr. D. Kelvin Bullock, Director for Equity Affairs for Durham Public Schools; Alliance Behavioral Healthcare, Community Education and Outreach, James Osborne; Southern Coalition for Social Justice, Co-Director of the Youth Justice Project, Peggy Nicholson; Court System - District Court Judges, the Honorable Shamielka Rhinehart & the Honorable Amanda Maris, as well as N.C. House Representative District 30, Marcia Morey. Their insight and advice added much value to our conversation with the community.

Our event planned for 150 guests and we had 150 people attend our event. Hillside High School brought a bus full of football players to attend the event. We spoke not only to community stakeholders in the audience, but we were also able to communicate vital information that impact Durham youth regarding the Durham criminal justice system directly to young people.

Special thanks to the planning committee, executive committee, and the Criminal Justice Resource Center staff for planning an excellent, informative, well executed and well attended event. Nisha G. Williams, Tasha Jones Butts, Andre Hinton, Jessica Jones, Drew Cummings, Angela Nunn, Amanda Fratrick, Brenda Howerton, Cameron Phillips, Celia Jefferson, and Gudrun Parmer.

Although JCPC meetings are open to the public, the public is often unaware of our monthly meetings so we as a council decided to take JCPC to the community!

My hope for next year is to host another community conversation highlighting the programs on stage as well as have a panel of half youth and half adults who actively work with youth on juvenile justice. 2017-2018 was a wonderful year for Durham's JCPC and I look forward to what we have in the 2018-2019 year as we continue to prepare for Raise the Age.

Part I. Risk Assessment Summary

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s).

Durham County Risk Factor Observations: Data from FY 2016-2017

(Refer to the attached chart for actual percentages)

- Court-involved Durham juveniles are more likely to have multiple (4 or more) referrals than statewide peers. (R2)
- The most serious prior adjudication for court-involved Durham juveniles is more likely to be a felony or serious misdemeanor than those of statewide peers. (R3)
- Prior assaults committed by court-involved Durham juveniles are more likely to have been committed with a weapon than assaults perpetrated by statewide peers. It is a small percentage (5% of 180 juveniles is only 9 individuals) (R4)
- Court-involved Durham juveniles are far more likely to have run away from home or a placement than their statewide peers. (R5)
- Court-involved Durham juveniles have substance abuse issues requiring assessment or treatment at higher rates than their statewide peers. (R6)
- School behavior problems for court-involved Durham youth are more likely to be serious, especially for the past 2 years. (R7)
- Court-involved Durham juveniles are more than 3 times likely to be a gang member or associate with a gang than their statewide peers. (R8)

Part II. Needs Assessment Summary

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (*noted by an asterisk*), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

Durham County Elevated Needs Observations: FY 2016-2017

- 27% of youth at intake reported to have level of substance abuse needing treatment (Y4)
- 46% of youth at intake reported to need more mental health assessment (Y8)
- 58% of youth at intake reported to have family member with a criminal history (42%) or were under active court supervision or gang involvement (16%) (F5)

Part III. Existing Community Resources Summary

Statewide contractual services available for Level II Juvenile Court involved youth in Durham County include the following:

- Eckerd Short Term Residential for males only
- West Care Residential Services for females only
- Dillon Crisis and Assessment Center operated by Methodist Home for Children
- Functional Family Therapy by AMIkids

Part IV. Gaps and Barriers in the Continuum of Services Summary

Programs to address community sanctions for juvenile court do not exist outside of programs funded by the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council.

Part V. Proposed Priority Services for Funding

The committee compared the services needed to address the elevated Juvenile Risk Factors and Juvenile Needs with services currently available in the community. Services which are currently available in the community and sufficient to meet the needs of court involved youth or those youth most at risk for court involvement are not considered as a priority for JCPC funding.

The Committee proposes that the following services in ranked order be approved as the funding priorities for FY 2018-2019.

1. Community Service/Restitution
2. Teen Court
3. Mentoring
3. Counseling
4. Skill Building Programs
5. Home Based Family Counseling
6. Mediation/Conflict Resolution
7. Structured Day
8. Tutoring/Academic Enhancement
9. Substance Abuse Treatment

The Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC) has studied the risk factors and needs of Juvenile Court involved youth in Durham County and hereby publishes this Request for Proposals. The JCPC anticipates funds from the NC Dept. of Public Safety, Division of Adult Correction and Juvenile Justice in the amount stated above to fund the program types specified below. Such programs will serve delinquent and at-risk youth for the state fiscal year 2018-2019 beginning on, or after, July 1, 2018. The use of these funds in this county requires a local match in the amount specified above.

The JCPC will consider proposals for the following needed programs:

Mentoring Skill Building Vocational Skill Building Tutoring/Academic Enhancement	Restitution Teen Court Mediation/Conflict Resolution	Substance Abuse Treatment Home-Based family Counseling Counseling
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Proposed program services should target the following risk factors for delinquency or repeat delinquency:

In FY 2016-17, 180 youth were assessed in the local office of Juvenile Justice for 409 juvenile complaints. Risk data for those youth indicate that Durham juveniles are more likely to have multiple prior referrals than their statewide peers; 34% of them had a history of running away from home or placement; 27% needed substance abuse assessment and/or treatment; 77% of youth reported moderate to serious school behavior problems and 65% of youth assessed lacked positive peer interactions, with 20% associating with gang or member of gang.

Programs should address some of the following findings reported in the needs assessments of youth referred to Juvenile Justice:

Peer Domain:	Services for youth lacking positive peers.
Individual Domain:	Services for youth reported to have mental health and/or substance use treatment needs.
Family Domain:	Services for youth not living with parents, experiencing domestic discord or violence, and/or coming from families with marginal or inadequate supervision skills.
School Domain:	Services for youth with moderate to serious school behavior problems.

Applicants are being sought that are able to address items below:

1. Program services compatible with research that are shown to be effective with juvenile offenders.
2. Program services are outcome-based.
3. The program has an evaluation component.

Local public agencies, 501(c)(3) non-profit corporations and local housing authorities are invited to submit applications to provide services addressing the above elements.
