Environmental Education Learning Library


The Durham SWCD Environmental Education Learning Library provides environmental education materials to teachers and other educators who work with children and aspire to share the joy of nature and the environment with them.

We also offer presentations on agricultural education topics such as gardening, greenhouse production, animal agriculture, best management practices and more.



Five member teams of students study, train and are then tested on their knowledge of five subject areas: Aquatics, Soils, Wildlife, Forestry and Current Environmental Issues.

SOILS / LAND USE - Learn about soil structure, how to interpret maps, and evaluate land forms, and about soil characteristics that affect urban and agricultural land issues. Gain an understanding of what an important ecosystem lies below the surface.

WILDLIFE - Students learn firsthand from wildlife experts about animal populations, their dynamics, and the importance of habitat conservation. Learn identification skills used by wildlife resource professionals in the field.



2019 NCF-Envirothon Competition comes to NC

In July 2019, over 500 of the brightest high school students, advisors, parents/chaperones and volunteers from across the U.S., Canada and China will be visiting North Carolina to participate in the 2019 NCF-Envirothon.

The 2019 NCF-Envirothon competition is the ultimate, international-level competition for high school teams participating in the Envirothon program. Thousands of dollars in scholarships are available for winning teams.



The event is hosted by a different state or Canadian province each year, but in 2019 it will be in North Carolina.

This is a unique opportunity to experience the top-level Envirothon competition right in our own backyard!

The 2019 event will be held from July 28th - Aug 2nd in Raleigh, NC and will be based in and around the campus of NC State University. The competition will be six days of education, activities and fun! Below is a sample of what will happen each day:

- Day 1 Team Registration, Opening Ceremony and then a Trading Session/Ice Cream Social.
- Day 2 Training Day, teams will learn about Soils/Land Use, Aquatics, Forestry, Wildlife and the CEI topic "Agriculture & the Environment: Knowledge & Technology to Feed the World."
- Day 3 Testing Day, teams will be tested in the five subject areas!
- Day 4 Educational (Fun) Day, teams (& volunteers) have a day to unwind, while also learning a little more about NC. Possible travel destinations include the NC Coast!
- Day 5 Oral Presentation (OP) Prep Day, teams will receive their OP scenario for the first time, and then be sequestered away from everyone for 6-8 hours to develop a 20 minute OP.
- Day 6 OP Judging Day, teams will deliver their OPs to one of several groups of judges. The top three scoring teams will re-present their OPs in front of everyone and a new set of judges. After dinner, the Awards Ceremony will reveal who will walk away with the top prize!

We need a huge number of volunteers to help each day of the event, as well as set-up and break-down on the days leading up to and after the event. Some duties include:

- be team buddies check in and check out teams
- be test runners

Teacher of the Year Contest

Nominate yourself or an outstanding K-12th grade teacher you know that excels in conservation & environmental education in the classroom.

Each year the Durham Soil & Water Conservation District recognizes outstanding conservation education efforts of Durham County's teachers by awarding a Conservation Education Teacher of the Year award to deserving teachers in Elementary, Middle and High School.

All K-12th grade teachers in public and private schools in Durham County are eligible. Winners from each category will be awarded a plaque and a cash prize of \$100 at our Annual Conservation Awards Banquet. Winners may go on to be entered in the NC Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts

Teacher of the Year competition. Eligibility:

- Educators must be teaching full time in the classroom and be personally responsible for utilizing a conservation education program.
- Shown concern, scope, and originality by integrating environmental education into his/ her curriculum.
- Provide a positive environmental role model.
- Team teachers are eligible, but awards will be made to the designated team leader.

BETC (Bionomic Education Training Center)



BETC is a workforce development training program with curriculum that

addresses water quality and conservation Best Management Practices.

Two units of curriculum were developed for the BETC program: a 30-day unit on engineering rain gardens and cisterns for water quality improvements and a 11-day unit on soils and water analysis. Though written for high school, the curriculum can be easily adapted to use in middle schools.

The curriculum provides students with an opportunity to obtain hands-on work experience in STEM, and encourages them to pursue careers in Green Infrastructure Technology and develop entrepreneurial skills.

NC Resource Conservation Workshop

The Resource Conservation Workshop (RCW) is a weeklong camp for students who are interested in conservation, the environment and/or our state's natural resources. The camp is sponsored by the NC Division of Soil and Water Conservation and the NC Association of Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

The RCW targets hopeful future environmental professionals by giving students a first-hand look at a wide array of conservation careers that they may not know about.

Since the camp is housed on the campus of NC State University, it also gives students a chance to explore college life.

The Durham SWCD's Board of Supervisors is committed to sponsoring at least one Durham County student delegate per year who wants to attend the workshop. The Durham SWCD will pay all registration fees. All the student will be responsible for is a few meals on their own and transportation to and from NCSU at the start and end of camp.
