Executive Summary

The Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council (JCPC), in fulfillment of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in the General Statutes of the State of North Carolina, has reviewed and updated the County Plan.

The JCPC has identified the issues and factors which have an influence and impact upon delinquent youth, at-risk youth, and their families in Durham County. Further, the JCPC has identified the strategies and services most likely to reduce/prevent delinquent behavior.

JCPC Action Plan Progress:

An Action Plan to impact delinquent behavior has been developed and implemented over the past fiscal year. With the goals, measurable objectives and corresponding outcomes, the JCPC proposes to prevent or reduce delinquent behavior in Durham County youth.

Goals:

- 1. Prevent and reduce delinquent behavior
- 2. Reduction of complaints
- 3. Parent involvement
- 4. Reduction in violations of community supervision
- 5. Program Completion

Major gaps in available service identified by the Durham County JCPC include the development and strengthening of effective and accessible alternatives to suspension programs, gang prevention and intervention programs and programs that increase parental involvement and support. Durham County JCPC is particularly interested in programs that are culturally competent, inclusive and accessible to youth and their families.

<u>Priorities for Funding:</u> Through a risk & needs assessment and a resource assessment, the JCPC has determined that the following services are needed to reduce/prevent delinquency in Durham County.

- 1. Teen Court
- 2. Restitution/Community Service
- 3. Interpersonal Skill building with Conflict Resolution54. Temporary Shelter Care
- 4. Runaway Shelter
- 5. Psychological Assessment
- 6. Home Based Family Counseling
- 7. Crisis Counseling
- 8. Academic Tutoring
- 9. Mentoring
- 10. Parent/Family skill building
- 11. Interpersonal Skill Building

- 12. Substance Abuse Treatment
- 13. Mediation

Monitoring and Evaluation: Each program funded in the past year by the JCPC has been monitored. The monitoring results and program outcomes evaluations were considered in making funding allocation decisions. The JCPC continues to conduct implementation monitoring of its action plan and its funded programs on a quarterly basis.

<u>Funding Recommendations:</u> Having published a Request for Proposals for these needed services for a minimum of thirty (30) days, the JCPC has screened the submitted proposals and has determined which proposals best meet the advertised needed services. As required by statute, the JCPC recommends allocation of the NC Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention (NC DJJDP) Funds to the following Programs in the amounts specified below for the upcoming fiscal year: (See JCPC Funding Allocations page):

Part I Risk

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Risk Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors after juveniles are referred with a complaint alleging that a delinquent act has occurred and prior to adjudication of the juvenile. The Juvenile Risk Assessment is an instrument used to predict the likelihood of the juvenile being involved in future delinquent behavior. For some youth, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

County Risk Factor Observations: Data from FY 2018-2019

- 56% or 92 youth identified as needing substance abuse assessment and/or treatment
- 77% or 126 youth had moderate to serious school behavior problems
- 31% or 51 youth identified as gang member or associates with gang
- 41% or 67 youth at intake reported to need more Mental Health Assessment.
- 60% or 98 youth at intake reported to come from families with marginal or inadequate supervision skills
- 60% or 98 youth at intake reported to come from families with criminal history or family member under court supervision or gang involvement

Part II. Needs

The Risk and Needs Assessment Committee also reviewed data gleaned from the Juvenile Needs Assessment instrument administered by Juvenile Court Counselors prior to court disposition of a juvenile. The Juvenile Needs Assessment is an instrument used to examine a youth's needs in the various domains of his life: The Individual Domain, The School Domain, The Peer Domain, and the Community Domain. This instrument was designed to detect service intervention needs as an aid in service planning. As with the Juvenile Risk Assessment, some of the individual item ratings may be heavily dependent upon information reported by the juvenile or the parent(s). For

these items (represented by percentages which with a star next to them), there is a likelihood of under-reporting the incidence of a particular behavior and the actual incidence may be higher than suggested by these figures. In those cases, the figure should be interpreted as a measure of the minimum level of occurrence.

County Elevated Needs Observations: FY

- 32% of youth at intake reported to have level of substance abuse needing treatment
- 41% of youth at intake reported to need more mental health assessment
- 16% of youth at intake reported gang involvement

Programs to address community sanctions for juvenile court do not exist outside of programs funded by the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council.

Part V. Proposed Priority Services for Funding

The committee compared the services needed to address the elevated Juvenile Risk Factors and Juvenile Needs with services currently available in the community. Services which are currently available in the community and sufficient to meet the needs of court involved youth or those youth most at risk for court involvement are not considered as a priority for JCPC funding.





These are areas where court-involved Durham juveniles are outliers when compared to statewide peers and comparison county peers in Risk/Needs Assessment scores. For FY18 there were 164 court-involved juveniles and 487 complaints in DCO (an average of 2.3 complaints per juvenile).

Race classification of the 164 juveniles: (Black 78%) (Hispanic 13%) (White 8%) (Asian <1%)

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DURHAM COUNTY JUVENILE CRIME PREVENTION COUNCIL BYLAWS

ARTICLE I: NAME, PURPOSE, POWERS, AND DUTIES

Section 1. Name: The name of the local planning body required by N.C.G.S. 147-33.60 shall be The Durham County Juvenile Crime Prevention Council, hereinafter called the "Council" or the "JCPC."

<u>Section 2. Purpose:</u> The purpose of the local Juvenile Crime Prevention councils is determined by the N.C. General Assembly and is outlined in N.C.G.S. 147-33.60.

As currently stated, the primary legislative intent is to develop community-based alternatives to training schools, to provide community-based delinquency and substance abuse prevention strategies and programs, and to provide noninstitutional dispositional alternatives that will protect the community and the juveniles.

It is further intended that these programs and services shall be planned and organized at the community level and developed in partnership with the State of North Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention, hereinafter called the "State" or the "DJJDP."

Section 3. Powers and Duties: The powers and duties of the JCPC are delineated in N.C. G.S. 147-33.66 and are summarized as follows:

- (a.) The Councils shall annually review the needs of juveniles in the county who are at risk of delinquency or who have been adjudicated undisciplined or delinquent, and analyze the resources available to address those needs. The JCPC shall advise the Board of County Commissioners of the results of their deliberations and review.
- (b.) The Councils shall ensure that appropriate intermediate dispositional options are available and shall prioritize funding for intermediate and community level sanctions for court adjudicated juveniles pursuant to minimum standards adopted by the State of North Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.
- (c.) The Councils shall perform the following functions on an ongoing basis:
 - 1) Assess the needs of juvenile in the community, evaluate the adequacy of resources available to meet those needs, and develop or propose ways to address unmet needs;
 - Evaluate the performance of juvenile services and programs in the community, and evaluate each funded program as a condition of continued funding;
 - 3) Increase public awareness of the causes of delinquency and of strategies to reduce the problem;
 - 4) Develop strategies to intervene and appropriately respond to and treat the needs of juveniles at risk of delinquency through appropriate risk assessment instruments;

- 5) Provide funds for services for treatment, counseling, or rehabilitation for juveniles and their families, including court-ordered parenting responsibility classes; and
- 6) Plan for the establishment of a permanent funding stream for delinquency prevention services.

ARTICLE II: MEMBERSHIP

<u>Section 1. Membership.</u> As a prerequisite for a county receiving funding for juvenile court services and delinquency prevention program, N.C. G.S. 147-33.61 states that the board of county commissioners shall appoint a Juvenile Crime Prevention Council, consisting of not more than 26 members that should include, if possible, the following:

- 1. The local superintendent(s), or that person's designee(s);
- 2. A chief of police in the county;
- 3. The local sheriff, or that person's designee;
- 4. The district attorney, or that person's designee;
- 5. The chief court counselor, or that person's designee;
- 6. The director of the area mental health, developmental disabilities, and substance abuse authority, or that person's designee;
- 7. The director of the county department of social services, or that person's designee;
- 8. The county manager, or that person's designee;
- 9. The local youth home director or that person's designee;
- 10. A substance abuse professional;
- 11. A member of the faith community;
- 12. A county commissioner;
- 13. A person under the age of 21;
- 14. A juvenile defense attorney;
- 15. The chief district court judge, or a district court judge designated by the chief district court judge;
- 16. A member of the business community;
- 17. The local health director, or that person's designee;
- 18. A representative from the United Way or other nonprofit agency;
- 19. A representative of a local parks and recreation program; and
- 20. Up to six members of the public with an interest in youth problems to be appointed by the Durham County board of Commissioners. Change from seven members to six

The Durham County Board of Commissioners shall modify the Council's membership as necessary to ensure that Council members reflect the racial and socioeconomic diversity of the community and to minimize potential conflicts of interest by members.

Section 2. Terms of Appointment: Each member of the JCPC shall serve for a term of two years, and may be reappointed. In order to provide for staggered terms, persons appointed for the positions designated in subdivisions (10), (12), (15), (17), and (18) of G.S. 147-33.61(a) shall be appointed for an initial term ending on June 30, 2000, and for two-year terms thereafter. All other persons appointed to the Council shall be appointed for an initial term ending on June 30, 2001, and for two-year terms thereafter.

N.C. G.S. 147-33.61(a) further directs that the chair and vice-chair shall be elected annually by the members of the Council.

<u>Section 3. Vacancies and removals:</u> Appointments to fill vacancies shall be for the remainder of the former member's term.

Members shall only be removed for misfeasance, malfeasance, or nonfeasance as determined by the Durham Board of County Commissioners.

The JCPC's attendance policy will be the same as the attendance policy adopted by the Durham Board of County Commissioners for all of their advisory boards.

<u>Section 4. Ex-Officio Members:</u> Program Directors or their designees shall be ex-officio members of the Durham JCPC, as directed by the State of North Carolina Department of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention.

ARTICLE III: OFFICIERS

<u>Section 1, Officers:</u> The officers of the Durham JCPC shall include a Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer, and Parliamentarian. Additional vice-chairs and such other assistant officers as needed may be authorized by the Council.

Section 2. Election of Officers: Officers shall be elected annually by a majority vote at a regular or special meeting in the spring, prior to the end of the fiscal year; and will assume office on the following July 1. The nominating committee shall present a proposed slate of officers to the JCPC, with additional nominations accepted from the floor. Voting will be accomplished by written ballot.

Section 3. Terms: Officers shall be elected for one year terms and may succeed themselves.

ARTICLE IV: MEETING

Section 1. Meetings and Quorum: As directed by N.C. G. S. 147-33.64 the Council must meet at least bi-monthly or more often if a meeting is called by the chair. A majority of members then in office shall constitute a quorum.

No official business can be enacted unless a quorum is present. A majority vote of the quorum is required for passing a motion.

The Durham JCPC shall meet in regularly scheduled meetings in accordance with the legislation and State policy, with the dates to be determined by the Council and announced in their annual calendar. Special meetings may be called by the Chair, or upon written request of at least three JCPC members. Additional meetings may be necessary to consider funding proposals.

<u>Section 2. Minutes:</u> Minutes shall be taken at every meeting in which official action is taken. They will be distributed prior to or at subsequent meetings, and must be approved by the JCPC at their next meeting.

Section 3. Open Meetings: All meetings shall be open to the public.

ARTICLE V: COMMITTEES

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall consist of all officers of the JCPC Standing Committee Chairpersons, and the immediate past chairperson of the Council. It can act on the Council's behalf between meetings of the JCPC or when directed by the JCPC to do so. They shall make recommendations as to its policies and procedures. In the event that the immediate past chair is no longer an appointed member of the JCPC said person will serve as an ex officio member of the Executive Committee with out vote.

<u>Section 2.</u> Standing Committees shall be established as determined by the JCPC on an annual basis, with the Committee Chairs appointed by the Council Chairperson.

<u>Section 3.</u> Ad Hoc Committees and their chairpersons may be appointed by the JCPC Chair for a specific task, and are dissolved upon completion of the assigned task.

ARTICLE VI: SELECTION OF PROJECTS TO BE FUNDED

<u>Section 1. Request for Proposals:</u> The Council shall annually develop and advertise a request for proposals process that is in compliance with the Office of Juvenile Justice's policies and procedures. Local guidelines, procedures, and a detailed calendar of events will be approved by the JCPC prior to starting the annual funding cycle.

All proposals applying for DJJDP funding will be reviewed and screened by the appropriate JCPC committee, and all programs meeting the RFP criteria will be given an opportunity to present their program's proposal to the full Council

Section 2. Monitoring and Evaluation: All existing funded programs will be monitored and reviewed by the appropriate JCPC committee at least twice a year, and continued funding will require a favorable recommendation from the site visit team. The JCPC will work with the State DJJDP to implement the evaluation system and instruments being developed at the state level, when completed.

Section 3. Eligibility to Receive DJJDP Funding: Any local public agency, private 501 © (3) non-profit corporation, or housing authority may apply for DJJDP state funds, if they meet minimum program standards and other guidelines set by the State.

Section 4. New Programs: New program not previously funded by the JCPC, must document their organization's fiscal and program competence to administer the program they are proposing, and meet other minimum standards set by the State and the JCPC. In addition, private non-profit organizations must submit proof of their incorporated status by a copy of their "Articles of Incorporation." They must also prove their non-profit 501 ©(3) "Exempt" status with the Internal Revenue Service through submission of written proof of the IRS's ruling on their application for exempt status, such as their IRS "Determination" letter; or they must submit proof that their application is in process with the IRS.

ARTICLE VII: GENERAL PROVISIONS

It is the policy of the Durham Juvenile Crime Prevention Council that the JCPC does not discriminate on the basis of sex, race, ethnic origin, age, disability, or religion in its programs or activities, in the allocation of funding, in employment policies or practices, or in the administration of any of its policies or procedures.

Section 1. Fiscal Year: The fiscal year of the JCPC shall be that of the State of North Carolina, July 1 through June 30.

<u>Section 2. Conflict of Interest:</u> All JCPC members shall conduct business in such a manner as to avoid both the appearance and fact of conflict of interest, between the Council and any organization in which said member has a substantial interest. Potential conflicts should be reported to the JCPC in advance of any transactions that might appear to be questionable, and will be so noted in the minutes.

No JCPC member who is paid with local JCPC grant funds or who directly supervises a JCPC funded program, shall be eligible to vote in funding decisions for said program, as this presents a possible conflict of interest. No JCPC member who is paid by or who directly supervises someone paid by local JCPC grant funds should serve on the monitoring site visit team for said program.

<u>Section 3. Proxies:</u> For any meeting of the JCPC, a member may appoint a representative to serve as their proxy to vote on their behalf. Said proxy must be executed in writing and may be for that meeting only, for any stated period of time to exceed the end of the fiscal year. Proxies may confer general voting rights or may be limited to prescribed action on a particular issue. A 'faxed' signature and document will be considered acceptable for this purpose.

<u>Section 4. Parliamentary Procedure:</u> The rules for parliamentary procedure shall be those of the latest edition of Robert's Rules of Order.

<u>Section 5. Electronic Meetings:</u> Meetings may also be held in a form other than physical presence, such as conference calls, teleconferences, or any other electronic communications technology. Any member may participate in a meeting of the JCPC by any such electronic means that allows all persons participating in the meeting to hear or otherwise interact with each other. Participation by these means shall be deemed presence in person at the meeting.

ARTICLE VIII: AMENDMENTS

These bylaws may be amended by a majority vote of those members of the JCPC present and voting at any regular or special meeting of the council, provided there is a quorum present.

NC Department of Public Safety JCPC Conflict of Interest Disclosure Form for JCPC Members

The purpose of disclosure of financial and personal interests (business, professional, or political) of JCPC members is to avoid conflicts of interest, potential conflicts of interest and the appearance of conflicts of interest between the member's private interest and his/her public duties. It is critical to this process that JCPC members examine, evaluate, and disclose those personal and financial interests that may pose a real or potential conflict of interest. Each JCPC member must take an active, thorough, and conscientious role in the disclosure and review process, including having a complete knowledge of how the JCPC member's private interests (business, professional, or political) might impact his/her position or duties on the council. JCPC members have an affirmative duty to provide any and all information that a reasonable person would conclude is necessary to disclose any conflict of interest, potential conflict of interest, or the appearance of a conflict of interest between the member's public and private interests; however the disclosure, review, and evaluation process is not intended to result in the disclosure of unnecessary or irrelevant personal information.

Therefore, personal relationships that may inappropriately influence (bias) or appear to influence actions must be disclosed. Conflict means a conflict or the appearance of a conflict between the private interests and official responsibilities of a person in a position of trust, including a Juvenile Crime Prevention Council member. [Examples of conflict of interest include, but are not limited, to a JCPC member being related to a JCPC funded program staff member, a JCPC member being employed by a competing applicant for JCPC funding, or a JCPC member or managing staff having personal, financial, professional, or political gain at the expense or benefit of the JCPC; other than the benefit of therapeutic intervention for the juveniles and families served by JCPC funded programs.]

Failure to disclose any conflicts of interest, potential conflicts of interest and the appearance of conflicts of interest within the JCPC may result in the DPS cessation of any further State funds.

Family Center can assist in helping him to be able to adjust and break habits and addictions that he may of started to cope with his current situation. They can help him to develop healthier habits but total express it is the individual that must want to change and work with the partners and with family support things can turn around.

They are anticipating 400 youth to come over to their program.
