

Child Welfare Spotlight Fostering in Durham County

- 324 Children in Care
- 101 Foster Homes in Durham
- 154 children placed out of Durham County
- * \$4.3 million a year expended to provide care and services for children in care
- TIPS-MAPP (Trauma Informed Parenting for Safety and Permanence/Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting) offered annually for prospective foster parents/adoptive parents





Mission of Child Welfare

- * To Protect Children from Abuse and Neglect: Child Safety is Primary Mission of Child Welfare
- To Support Families through Services Resolve Major Challenges
- To Establish Permanency for Children Who Enter Foster Care
- To Ensure the Well-Being and Health of Children in Foster Care
- To Prepare Older Foster Children for Independent Living

It's about safety, health, well-being, and permenance



Other Important Footnotes

- The licensing of a foster home is a joint effort of the county and the state
- * Foster Homes are temporary safe havens for children
- * Foster Parents must be able to provide for and care for foster children as their own (support visits, ensure education, monitor health, effectively parent)
- * Foster Parents and DSS partner to support the placement with DSS making overall decisions regarding placements, removals, services, and case-plans
