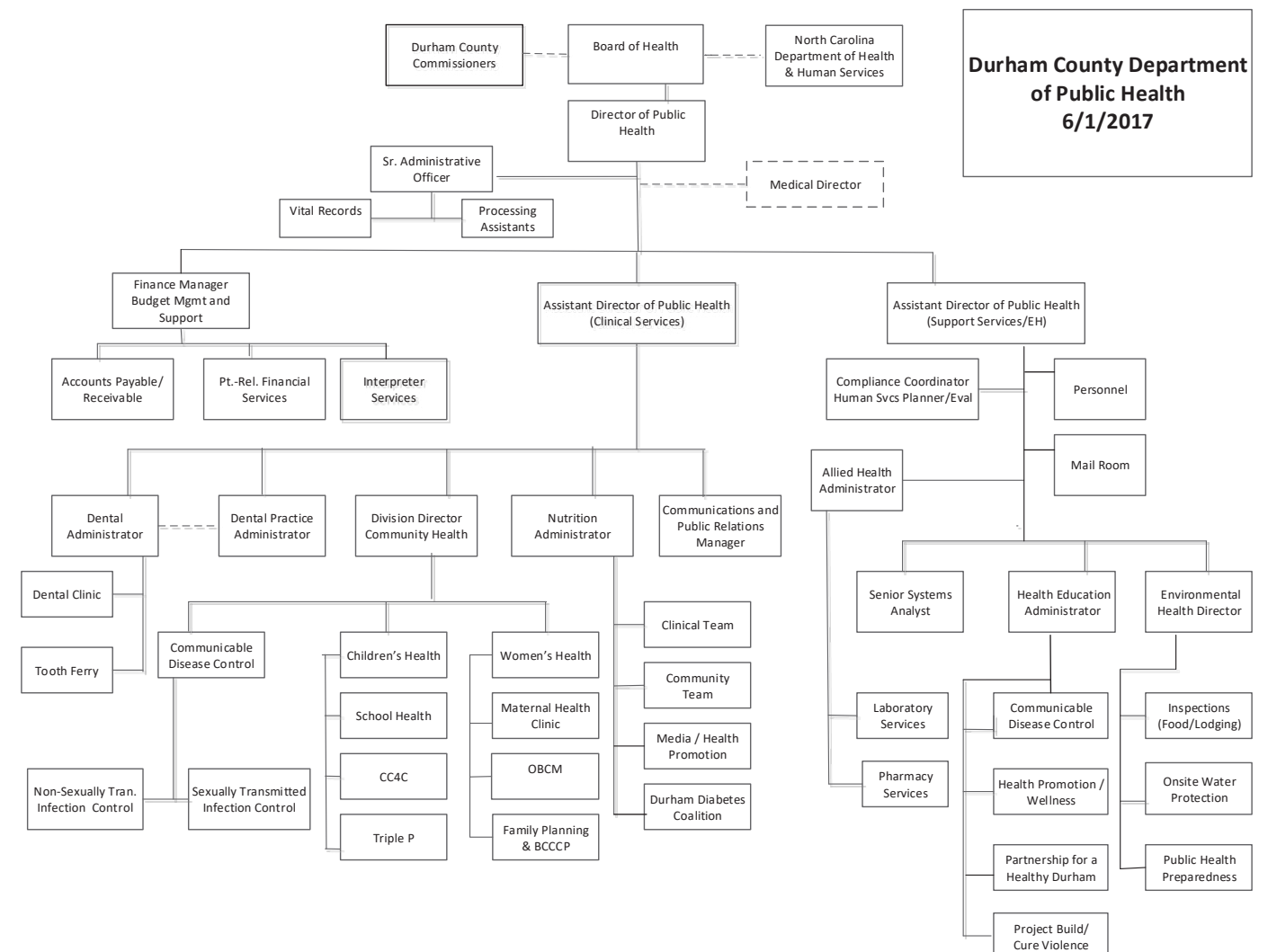

Administration, Allied Health, Community Health, Dental, Environmental Health, Health Education and Community Transformation, and Nutrition.

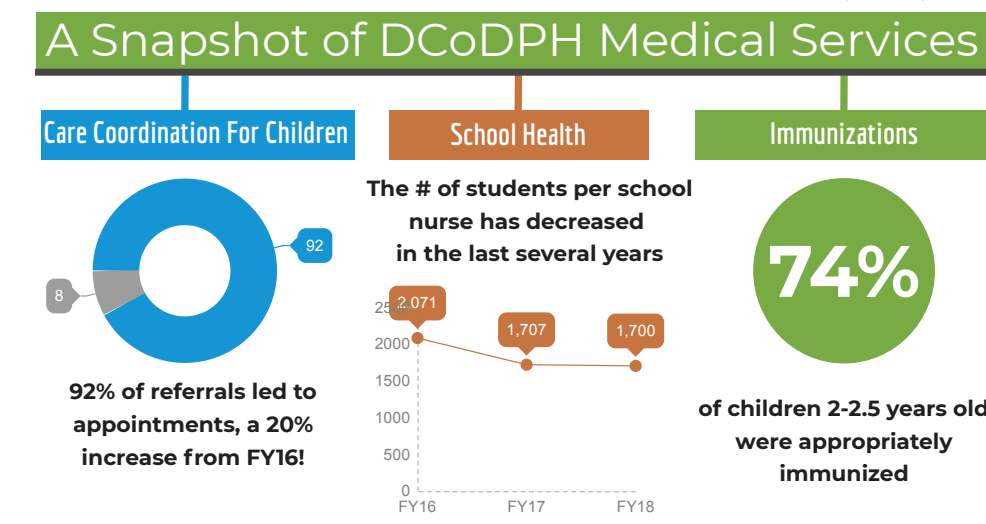
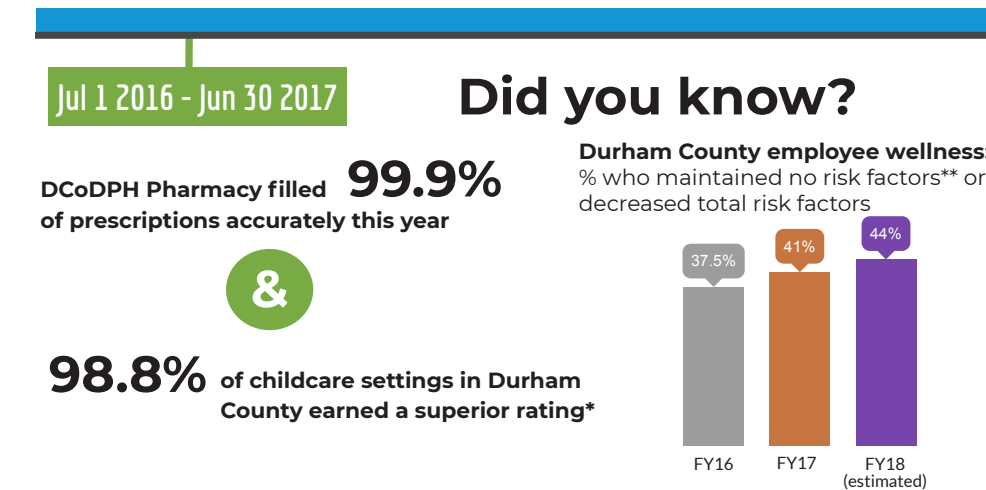

## HIV/STD Clinic

The clinic tested 1,712 clients in 2017 through the Testing Only Service or Express Service. The service is for asymptomatic guests that report exposure to certain STIs. **The clinic screens approximately 100 persons per week.**

## Care Coordination for Children (CC4C)

CC4C works to improve the health and well-being of children from birth to 5 years of age, who meet the toxic stress criteria "homeless or living in a shelter" and may show signs of additional behavioral or mental health concerns.

CC4C is a partner in a new collaborative effort with Families Moving Forward, an agency for homeless families. Social work and registered nurse care managers assess children and families in at risk populations with the goal of improving health outcomes and reducing costs. **CC4C Care Managers accepted referrals for 23,193 children and families in at-risk populations during FY17.**



## Jail Medical Services

The **Jail Health Program** provides health services to detainees of Durham County Detention Center and to the residents of the Durham County Youth Home. Services are provided by a contract agency, Correct Care Solutions, which specializes in Correctional Health. Every detainee receives a health assessment upon initial intake and is tested for infectious diseases. Medical services are contingent upon the results of the health assessment and can vary from dental care, chronic care, mental health, and substance abuse/detox services.

# Community Health

## School Health Program

Through a partnership with Durham Public Schools, Public Health School Nurses offered **Mass Vision Screenings** with follow-up referrals as necessary for all first grade students.

Screenings have the ability to identify additional vision issues that may need referral and evaluation by an eye care professional.

Approximately **2,327 vision screenings were within normal limits and 214 students required vision referrals to a licensed optometrist or ophthalmologist.** Only 16 parents declined their children's screenings.



## Rabies Control

The DCoDPH and the Animal Services division of the Durham County Sheriff's Office partnered to give free rabies vaccinations on Saturday, September 24, 2016. **Over 300 dogs, cats, and ferrets were vaccinated.**

## Refugee Health Program

DCoDPH sees refugees for initial screenings, follow-up immunizations and final paperwork for greencard status.

## Community Health (cont.)



### Women's Health

#### Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program (BCCCP)

BCCCP provided breast and cervical cancer screening services and diagnostic covered services to females eligible in Durham County and nearby counties without BCCCP programs. Diagnostic services were provided to follow-up abnormal mammography and abnormal pap smears.

#### Family Planning Clinic

The Family Planning clinic provided comprehensive contraception and fertility control services with an emphasis on teenage and lower income adults.

- ◆ The clinic was the only organization in Durham County to be awarded the 3-year NC DHHS Title X grant funding of approximately \$79,910 per year.

### Maternal Health Clinic

The Maternal Health clinic provided comprehensive prenatal services to low income, medically low-risk pregnant women.

The clinic hosted the first NC Oral Health Section statewide Basic Screening Survey (BSS). A state dental hygienist conducted oral screenings at the clinic in August 2016.

- ◆ The clinic continues to provide valuable learning experiences for Duke resident physicians, midwives, and students.

### Obstetrics Care Management (OBCM)

OBCM services were provided to assist Medicaid and non-Medicaid eligible pregnant women in accessing resources and other services that contributed to good pregnancy outcomes.

- ◆ DCoDPH OBCM was one of the 16 counties invited to the inaugural Obstetrics Care Management Large County Learning Collaborative meeting in December 2016.
- ◆ DCoDPH successfully embedded two OBCM staff at Duke High Risk OB clinic.

## Dental Services

Our Dental Division serves children from their first tooth until their 21<sup>st</sup> birthday. We also serve pregnant women (12-28 weeks).

### New Tooth Ferry

In December 2016, our new Tooth Ferry mobile dental unit was delivered from LifeLine Mobile in Columbus, Ohio. The Tooth Ferry, a custom-designed van, is a fully equipped dental office with two dental chairs, front office, and restroom. The purpose of the Tooth Ferry is to treat students without a dental home at Durham's Public Elementary Schools. The vehicle also has a wheel chair lift. Features include: a side bump-out for additional space in the clinic area, DVD player and screens above each chair, handheld x-ray unit and technology capacity to view dental software and x-rays in real time – no matter where the Tooth Ferry is in the county. The dental team is looking forward to serving students in schools for years to come.

# Environmental Health



Durham County boasts 150 permitted Mobile Food Units — ranked 2<sup>nd</sup> in the state.

*The Environmental Health Division assisted in the design and construction parameters for a new large scale Mobile Food vendor's commissary.*

Staff collaborated with the owner/operator, Will Pettis, to give Mobile Food vendors a facility that is functional and hygienic with regards to NC food code. The large scale facility is one of a kind in the state of North Carolina. Caterers and Mobile Food vendors have flooded into Will and Pops new commissary due to its functionality and individual stations. Each vendor of the commissary has an assigned prep space exclusively for their use. Vendors also have assigned shelving within two large walk in refrigerators for bulk cold storage and for cooling hot foods. All vendors of Will and Pops have 24/7 key fob access to the gated site and building. Each door or gate where the

fob is used creates a digital record of the use of the facility. This assists Environmental Health in documenting proper use of the facility as required by code.

Vendors have access to common areas such as 2 large cook lines with multiple stoves, grills and ovens. Other common areas are a series of 3 compartment sinks for ware washin, prep sinks and stations for vegetable washing, and raw protein prep. The facility has one main electrical area for vendors to connect electrical appliances for any prep needs. Multiple carts and common shelves are available for air drying and transport of foods within the facility or to the Mobile Units.

The design of Will and Pops Commissary has become the standard that we would like for all commissaries to design and operate properly and effectively. Hopefully this standard will be viewed by state representatives so that all future commissaries can operate as effectively as Will and Pops Commissary has for our county.

## Preparedness Program

The DCoDPH Preparedness Program exercised three different types of public health response events. Each of these events tested the health department's readiness as well as identified equipment needed in the response.

- ◆ **Full-scale Sheltering Exercise** that included nine agencies from the state, regional and local levels. The exercise demonstrated the staff's knowledge of the skills needed when opening a shelter, registering, feeding and providing health services to clients, maintaining pet sheltering, co-location operations and closing the shelter.
- ◆ **Continuity of Operations Plan (COOP) Full-scale Exercise** involved five agencies from the state and local level. The purpose of the exercise was to ensure the health department's capability to move assets in a timely manner.
- ◆ **Medical Countermeasure (MCM) Plan** demonstrated the health department's capability to plan and successfully execute a large-scale response requiring off-site medication (influenza vaccine) distribution and dispensing.



# Health Education and Community Transformation

The Health Education and Community Transformation Division provides learning opportunities to help the community adopt healthy behaviors and develop skills to prevent disease and disability. Services include: STD testing, health promotion and wellness, health fairs, and webinars. Programs housed under the division include: Partnership for a Healthy Durham, Project BUILD, and Bull City United.

Implemented in November 2016, **Bull City United (BCU) uses the evidence-based Cure Violence strategy, a public health model that works to reduce shootings and killings.** The program operates in two neighborhoods,

McDougald Terrace and South Side, which were chosen based on the per capita level of violence in these census tracts. The program launched with a "Week of Peace" event held during January 2017, in

which over 900 community members from eight different neighborhoods participated in daily anti-violence events around Durham.

Since the launch, BCU has opened an office in the McDougald Terrace neighborhood and currently operates with a staff of eight: three outreach workers, four violence interrupters, and a supervisor.

- ◆ Team members rely on their experiences and relationships to serve as trusted messengers who connect with high risk individuals in order to resolve conflicts and promote peace.
- ◆ Violence interrupters mediate conflicts to prevent them from becoming violent. BCU outreach workers identify and work with high risk individuals to connect them to jobs, education, and other services.
- ◆ Team members coordinated multiple events in the McDougald Terrace and South Side communities to raise awareness of gun violence.
- ◆ The team also works daily on the streets of the target neighborhoods to distribute educational material about violence prevention, build relationships with and educate local residents, and send the message that violence is a behavior that can be changed.



## At a Glance

- ◆ Number of employees: **32** staff, health educators, violence interrupters, outreach workers, epidemiologist
- ◆ **5,470** public interactions through Chronic Disease prevention programs
- ◆ **8,791** students received Reproductive Health and Safety education, which includes Human Growth and Development and comprehensive sexuality education.
- ◆ The testing teams, Jail and Integrated Targeting Testing Services (ITTS), tested individuals for **HIV (2,377), Syphilis (2,312), Gonorrhea and Chlamydia (1101) and Hepatitis C (1,160).**
- ◆ **19,748** condoms were distributed to high risk sexually active and positive individuals.

# Allied Health (Laboratory and Pharmacy)

The DCoDPH Laboratory provides testing for the patients registered in our on-site clinics, community outreach events, and community partners. The pharmacy provides prescription services for patients registered in our clinics. We only carry medicines for the Family Planning, Maternal Health, STI, Tuberculosis, and Dental clinics.

## New STI Testing

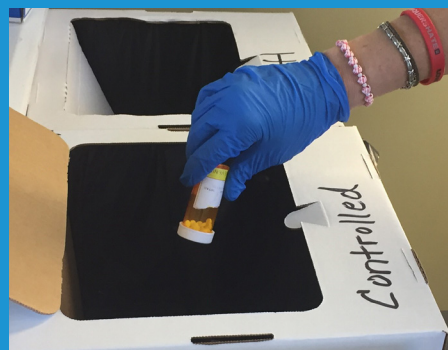
**Trichomonas vaginalis testing:** This test delivers results in 7-10 business days, or less, and can confirm a Trichomonas diagnosis — something our previous testing method might not have detected.

**Rapid Syphilis Testing (RST):** This test delivers results in 12 minutes and can provide immediate confirmation of a syphilis diagnosis. Compare this to test results from the NC Public Health Laboratory that can take up to a week.

## STI Testing for Orange County

The Laboratory collaborated with the Orange County Health Department to develop a plan to provide **STI Testing for Orange County patients**. The goal is to reduce patient wait time from collection to results, which leads to quicker treatment. It is the first step in establishing the DCoDPH Laboratory as a Reference Laboratory and the first time that lab testing will generate revenue.

## Medication Take Back Events



The Pharmacy collaborated with the DEA to provide two Medication Take Back Events

during FY16-17. They were held in October 2016 and April 2017. These events offer community members the opportunity to safely dispose of expired or unused medication. This is important in preventing accidental poisonings, keeping medications out of the hands of our youth, and protecting our waters.

## Most Notable Highlight

**The Pharmacy made FREE Naloxone kits available to the public.** Naloxone is a medication used to assist a person experiencing an opiate-related overdose. People who may benefit from a Naloxone kit include:

- ◆ People at risk of experiencing an opiate-related overdose
- ◆ Family and friends of a person at risk for experiencing an opiate-related overdose
- ◆ People in the position to assist a person at risk of experiencing an opiate-related overdose

# Nutrition

DCoDPH's 25 member Nutrition Division works hard to help Durham residents improve their diet through education and counselling.

However, that teaching can be for naught if people cannot access healthy foods, either because they lack transportation to get to a grocery store or because the food is too expensive. Nutrition services are provided at health department clinics, Durham Public Schools, in childcare settings, and community sites. All nutrition services are provided by Registered Dietitians who are licensed by the North Carolina Board of Dietetics/Nutrition.



## At A Glance:

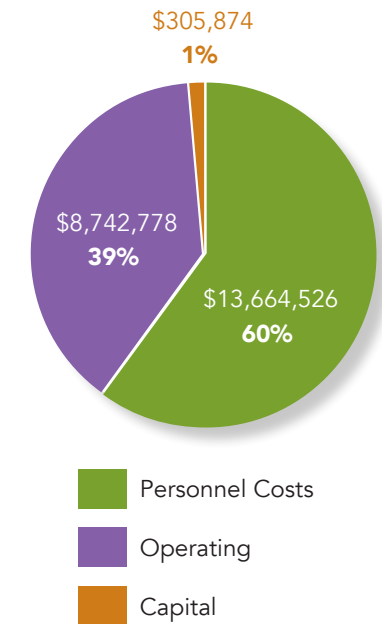
- ◆ **2,127** nutrition contacts to include medical nutrition therapy counseling sessions, diabetes self-management education, consults, and group nutrition education sessions.
- ◆ **91%** of clients seen for nutrition services had a positive outcome at follow-up visit.
- ◆ **31,501** direct education contacts in schools through the DINE program made a positive nutrition behavior change as evidenced by their willingness to eat healthier foods.
- ◆ **251** people shopped with Double Bucks at the Farmers Market July 2016 – April 2017, spending \$14,921 in SNAP and Double Bucks combined.
- ◆ Provided **163** nutrition workshops that reached **2,169** adults
- ◆ Provided **5** grocery store tours, reaching **28** households.

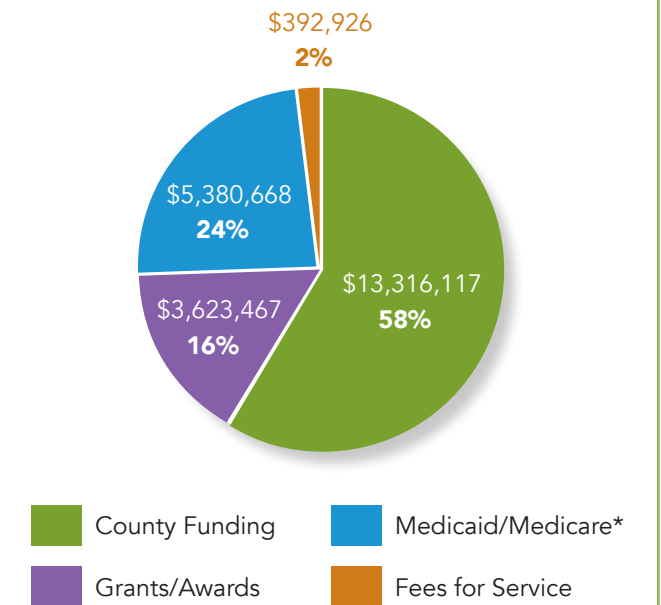
