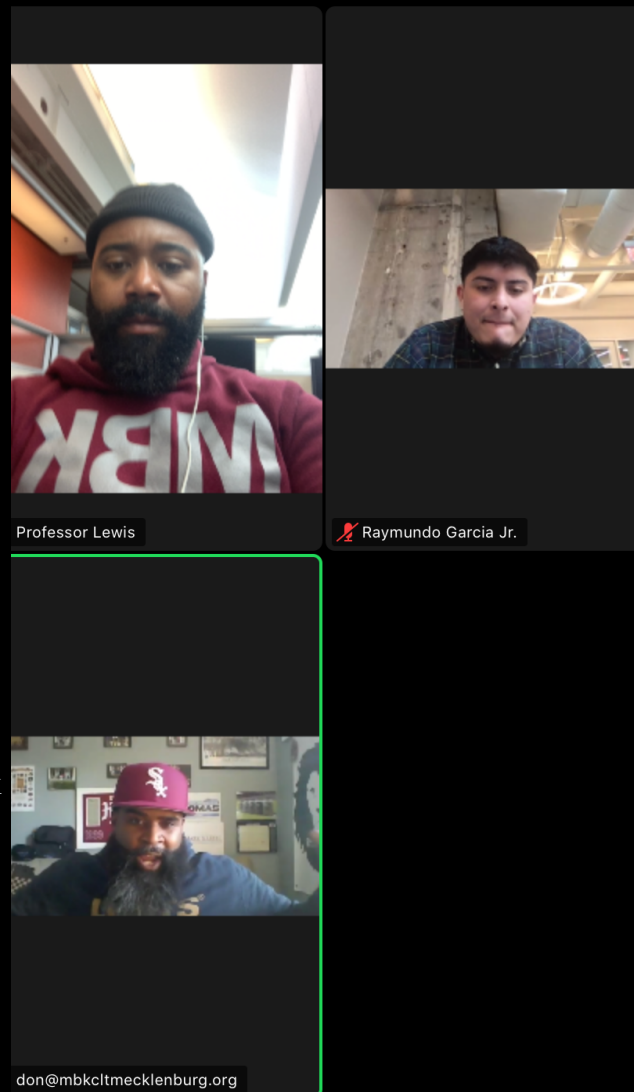

NEWS EVENTS GRANTS

The Annie E. Casey Foundation is requesting proposals for a research and design project that will inform efforts on youth engagement and partnership in its juvenile justice. The selected organization will be a nonprofit and it will use the findings and analysis from the research phase to design strategies for authentic partnerships between young people and adults in juvenile justice reform. The Foundation will make one award with a budget of \$50,000 to \$75,000.

Afterschool - Job Descriptions and Duties



Site Lead - \$14 per hour/ 23 hours per week

Each Site Lead will be responsible for oversight of the program delivery, interface with feeder school staff, substitute as a tutor as needed, conduct tutor observations with the Program's Coordinator, obtain daily attendance and other student data, prepare and close out the daily sessions, verify time sheets, upload records to the database, and support the implementation plan.

Teachers - \$13 per hour/ 20 hours per week

Three teachers will be hired at each site. Teachers will provide programming as per the site lead plan, attend all staff meetings/trainings, interface with the students, parents, and feeder school. Teachers are responsible for the core reading and math interventions that are implemented. They may assist with daily attendance and preparation for student's activities. Teachers are a key component in meeting the deliverables of the grant by improving students' grades.

Tutors: \$10 per hour/ 18 hours per week

Three tutors will assist with tutoring students as well as completion of homework and projects. The provided services will be offered during power hour sessions in small groups at least four times a week alternating between math and reading. They will assist in monitoring and implementing enrich activities.

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We believe every black boy and man deserves equal opportunity to achieve success. MBK Durham's vision is to make this a reality for all our boys and young men, each one of whom is critical to our overall success. By realizing this vision, we are creating a brighter, more promising future for our black boys and young men
