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| Urban Ministries of Durham (UMD) | UMD offers food, shelter, and case management to homeless men, women, and children. In collaboration with their case manager, each person makes a Housing Plan -- a series of goals that need to be accomplished to leave the shelter for their own apartment. People working toward their Housing Plan goals can stay in the shelter as long as they need, typically one to three months. | Families Moving Forward          | Families Moving Forward helps families in the crisis of homelessness find their way home. It provides temporary housing and food, case management, skills education, and connection to community resources to help parents and children thrive in stable homes. The facility currently provides emergency shelter and supportive services for up to three months. Case management staff meets with every family to set family goals that address educational, vocational, health and emotional needs. Individuals using substances will be assessed to determine the need for substance use disorder treatment/services and any recommendations for treatment/services. Case management is continued for up to 12 months after families exit the emergency shelter program to ensure guests' long-term stability and prevent returns to homelessness. | 300 N. There is a halfway house for women, transitional home for men and transitional home for women. Guests may stay in the halfway house for 6 months and the transitional houses for 30 days, with a 45-day max. The additional stay is dependent on several variables (e.g. patient need) and is on a case-by-case basis. The program's goal is to connect guests with substance use treatment and help them find long term housing. Services provided include case management and transportation to appointments. CASCADE provides services that promote the physical and mental well-being of mothers and their children as a family unit. The goal is to help women become drug/alcohol free so they can deliver healthy babies and parent successfully. Services provided include case management, intensive outpatient treatment, prenatal care, clothing, food, childcare, transportation, parenting classes, job skills training, and aftercare. Residents typically stay between 6-10 months. The program has a full-time case manager to assist residents with their goals and progress. While working on goals of increased self-sufficiency, veterans connect with the Durham Veterans Affairs (VA) Medical Center services, community resources and employment opportunities. Some individuals receive treatment for substance use disorder at the VA. Services provided include: temporary housing (3-6 months), case management, housing location assistance, employment support, ministry support as needed and other linkages to community resources.
