"Good evening, everyone. Thank you for the time.

As every parent knows, life with a baby is unpredictable. On any given day, you don't know if you're going to wake up to sunshine, giggles, and happiness or Oscar winning shrieks. Last week I had one of those days where even I felt like shrieking. My childcare fell through, and I ended up having to bring Aaliyah with me to the chambers.

To be honest, I was nervous. As proud as I am to be her mom and to be a working parent, in general it's always hard to juggle parenting and service and the last thing I wanted to do was disrupt our proceedings. This was my first-time bringing Aaliyah to a commission meeting. I didn't know what to expect. That's why I want to express my gratitude tonight for the patience, kindness, and understanding that was shown last week on a tough day.

In particular, I so appreciate the support and love Aaliyah and I received from Acting County Manger Claudia Hager, our Clerk Monica Wallace, her team Macio Carlton and Shaunecie Wardrick, Deputy County Manager Maurice Jones, Attorney Al Andrews, Public Health Director Rod Jenkins, Commissioner Jacobs, Commissioner Carter and Commissioner Burns. I could not be prouder to work

with a body of Commissioners, staff, and constituents who show support for working parents and give grace to their colleagues when life happens.

As a Board of all women, we have the opportunity to model the reality of being an elected parent and breakdown barriers that keep more parents of small kids from serving. And that's important not just for me, but for every parent in Durham County. Even beyond these halls, I truly believe that if led by example, we can set a new standard for workplaces across our County. Because working parents shouldn't have to leave our lives at the door when we clock into work. And we shouldn't have to worry that every childcare emergency will throw our jobs into jeopardy, either.

We should be celebrated as parents, as leaders, as members of our community. Thank you all for upholding that standard. I can't tell you how much it means to me and my family."

23-0691 Proclamation – Durham Recovery Month

Commissioner Carter read the following proclamation:

DURHAM RECOVERY MONTH | 2023

- **WHEREAS,** behavioral health is now recognized as an essential part of one's overall health and wellbeing; and
- **WHEREAS,** the costs of not encouraging mental health and substance use recovery is significant for individuals, families, neighborhoods and the community at large; and
- **WHEREAS,** recovery from mental and substance use disorders occurs every day through a variety of prevention, recovery support resources and treatment programs; and
- **WHEREAS,** people in recovery strive to achieve healthy lifestyles, stable homes, meaningful daily activities, stronger neighborhoods and contribute in positive ways to the larger community; and
- **WHEREAS,** the burden of mental illness in the United States is among the highest of all diseases, and mental disorders are among the most common causes of disability; and
- **WHEREAS,** recent figures suggest that approximately 1 in 4 adults in the United States had a mental health disorder in the past year1 and 1 in 17 had a serious mental illness; and
- WHEREAS, mental health disorders also affect children and adolescents at an increasingly alarming rate. People, including children and adolescents, with untreated mental health disorders are at high risk for many unhealthy and unsafe behaviors, including alcohol or drug misuse, violent or self-destructive behavior, and suicide; and

WHEREAS, the National Institute of Mental Health (NIMH) reports that in 2021 57.8 million adults experienced mental illness while only about 47 percent received mental health treatment; and

WHEREAS, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) reported that in 2021, 46.3 million Americans aged 12 and older met diagnostic criteria for having a substance use disorder while only an estimated 6 percent received any treatment for their substance use; and

WHEREAS, in an effort to help more people achieve and sustain long-term recovery, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA), the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP), Recovery Community of Durham (RCOD) and the Justice Services Department (JSD) invite all residents of Durham County, North Carolina to participate in National Recovery Month.

NOW THEREFORE, I, Brenda A. Howerton on behalf of the Durham Board of County Commissioners do hereby proclaim the month of September 2023 as

"RECOVERY MONTH"

in Durham County, and hereby call upon the people of Durham County to observe this month with appropriate programs, activities, and ceremonies to celebrate people in recovery and those who support them. Everyone's journey is different, but we are all in this together.

23-0692 Resolution Honoring Chukwuemeka A. Manning, Sr.

Commissioner Burns read the following resolution:

CHUKWUEMEKA AJIRI MANNING SR.

WHEREAS, the Durham community lost a valued member and leader on Saturday, June 17, 2023, with the passing of Chukwuemeka Manning Sr. or "Chuk" as he passionately known to all; and

WHEREAS, Chuk was heavily involved in the Durham community which led him to work with Bull City United. His duties included community outreach, violence prevention, and serving as a liaison and advocate for justice involved individuals; and Chuk worked with the City of Durham Innovation Team (I-Team) where he helped WHEREAS, develop numerous projects/programs designed to assist inmates returning to Durham after incarceration: and Chuk took the lead in the development of the "Welcome Home Program," a program WHEREAS, designed to help justice involved individuals coming home from prison by providing peer support and care packages; and WHEREAS. Chuk provided unwavering peer support to returning citizens helping them navigate through the reentry process and the systems within Durham. Chuk worked with and received referrals from various community agencies including (Religious Coalition for a Non-Violent Durham, Restorative Transitions, FIT and Justice Services Department) and was always willing to meet with people to determine ways to provide peer support (He never seemed to be more than 10-15 minutes away); and WHEREAS, Chuk was involved with Brian Hamilton's Inmates to Entrepreneurs/Brian Hamilton Foundation, NC Second Chance Alliance, Transitional Jobs Program, DEAR, NC Hope, NC Step Up, The City of Durham OEWD, NC NABCJ and the list goes on; and Chuk was appointed to the Durham Criminal Justice Advisory Committee in 2023; and WHEREAS, WHEREAS, Chuk was a part of the Durham Local Reentry Council since its inception in 2018; where he advocated and worked tirelessly to develop strategies to address the challenges faced by justice involved individuals in Durham, NC; and Chuk's care and compassion for people was also seen through his role as a proud father WHEREAS, to Chukwuemeka Manning Jr., Luvvey Manning, Precious Manning, and Skylar Manning. NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that we, the members of the Durham County Board of Commissioners, do hereby resolve to honor CHUKWUEMEKA AJIRI MANNING SR. for his lifelong work as a passionate, generous, and highly respected advocate, community leader and visionary.

Public Hearings

23-0687 Public Hearing for Unified Development Ordinance Text Amendment Regarding Phased Development and Tree Preservation (TC2200004)

Robin Schultze, Senior Planner/Arborist stated the Board was requested to conduct a public hearing and receive public comments on the Unified Development Ordinance Text Amendment, Phased Development and Tree Preservation (TC2200004). He added the text amendment proposed revisions to the Design Standards (new Section 7.9, Grading Setbacks), Tree Protection and Tree Coverage standards (Section 8.3), Project Boundary Buffer standards (Section 9.4), and Requirements for Subdivisions (new Section 13.9, Phased Development) within the Unified Development Ordinance (UDO) in order to: Address ongoing concerns regarding soil erosion during the development of large residential sites; Incentivize better management and encourage more deliberate design regarding grading and topography during land development; Amend tree coverage and preservation standards in order to prioritize preservation of existing tree coverage instead of tree replacement, where possible.

The Board stated they received questions from residents regarding the options for variances. Mr. Schultz replied the utilities were in the right-of-way and not in the buffer unless the developer could show hardship and there was no other way to provide services without going through the buffer. Mr. Schultz added state law required options for variances. The Board questioned the decision making for the size of the mass grading for phases. Mr. Schultz responded that the decision was based on existing ordinance and from research on other municipalities ordinances. The Board asked if the policy was written to allow changes and improvement as needed. Mr. Schultz replied yes; adding, the policy would be reviewed and improved if needed with the Universal Development Ordinance rewrite.

The Board inquired about incentives for affordable housing. Sarah Young, Planning Director responded adding incentives to an ordinance at one level would cause a penalty at another level. The Board asked who determined if the development met requirements. Mr. Shultz stated the Planning staff made that determination. The Board inquired about setbacks and buffers. Mr. Schulz responded buffers required plantings and setbacks was land set aside with limitations on grading. The Board asked if the text amendment would limit grading to help prevent drop-offs. Ryan Eaves, Durham County Stormwater and Erosion Control Manager responded the hope was for the text amendment to encourage developers to design to the topography of the existing land and not have drop-offs near the property lines.

Chair Howerton opened the public hearing.

Pamela Williams, Citizen

Ms. Williams stated boundaries, setback and buffers standards and requirements were a concern with the ordinance text amendment.

Donna Stainback, Citizen

Ms. Stainback stated the text amendment concept raised concern about implementation issues.

Rebecca Freeman, Citizen

Ms. Freeman stated the ordinance text amendment did not fully address issues with tree preservation and reducing runoff.

Wanda Rally, Citizen

Ms. Rally stated the text amendment would not preserve any additional trees than the current set standards.

Pam Andrews, Citizen

Ms. Andrews stated the ordinance text amendment did not address variances for buffers, wetlands,

streams and increased tree protection.

Thomas Freeman, Citizen

Mr. Freeman stated the variances defeated the purpose of the text policy.

Robin Barefoot, Citizen

Ms. Barefoot asked the Board to say no to mass grading and write ordinances to protect residents and the environment.

Chair Howerton closed the public hearing.

The Board inquired about site inspections and violations. Mr. Eaves stated the sites in Eastern Durham under development received frequent inspections compared to other sites and non-compliance and violations were issued as needed. He added his department requested a new position to help with site inspections.

Vice Chair Jacobs asked County Manager Dr. Sowell to contact the City to receive information about the policy around tree canopies, data on how many trees were being preserved and planted versus how many trees were being removed and how the goal would be met.

Ms. Trapp stated Mr. Hodges was honored in May 2023 by the Durham County Cooperative Extension and no unveiling was planned upon approval.

Ms. Trapp shared the 2021 Carl D. Hodges Conference Room Naming Request which highlighted the following: Durham County Naming/Renaming Policy Highlights, Durham County Naming Committee, Naming Request, Committee Recommendation and Next Steps.

Hodges Conference Room' would be posted in silver metallic letters above the entry to the conference room doors and Donna Rewalt, Cooperative Extension Director and staff were displaying the biography and accomplishments of Mr. Hodges outside of the conference room.

Delphine Sellars, Former Cooperative Extension Director

Ms. Sellars stated she was honored to be mentored by Mr. Hodges and thanked him for paving the way for her to serve as a former Cooperative Extension Director.

Carl Hodges, Son of Carl D. Hodges

Mr. Hodges stated the family created the Carl D. Hodges, Sr. Memorial Endowment Scholarship to provide financial assistance to students in Durham, Cumberland and Northampton counties and thanked the County for the naming request.

Terry Hodges, Son of Carl D. Hodges

Mr. Hodges was in support of the naming request and stated his mother (Christine Hose) was the base of his father's accomplishments.

Chair Howerton closed the public hearing.

Vice Chair Jacobs asked the County to plan an additional ceremony event for the Carl D. Hodges Conference Room in the future.
