Classroom Presentations, Pre-K-12th Grade

Popular presentations include soils/erosion, watershed models, wildlife, water quality, vermicomposting, recycling, watersheds, pollinators, and more!

We also offer presentations on agricultural topics such as gardening, greenhouse gas production, animal agriculture, best management practices, and more.

3rd Grade Environmental Education Field Days

The 3rd Grade Environmental Education Field Day is a chance for Durham students and teachers to put down the books, get out of the classroom, and learn firsthand about our natural world directly from scientists and conservationists, all while having fun! The NC Envirothon program is a hands-on environmental science and natural resources competition for middle and high school students. Five-member teams of students study, train, and are tested on their knowledge of five subject areas: Soils, Wildlife, Aquatics, Forestry, and Current Environmental Issues.

Through outdoor activities, teamwork, critical thinking, leadership skills training, and more, the Envirothon program is developing tomorrow's informed leaders!



Schedule a training session or borrow materials!

We work with teams to coordinate training sessions with resource professionals. These trainings allow students to learn the hands-on components of the Envirothon material such as skull and pelt identification, using a Biltmore stick, navigating the soil survey book, and more.

GRANT OPPORTUNITIES

DCo Agricultural Economic Development Grant Program

The Agricultural Economic Development Grant Program offers cost-share grants to assist farmers, nonprofits impacting the local food system, and schools promoting Agriculture Development and Outdoor Environmental Learning Centers in Schools.

School grants are awarded for up to \$1,500. These funds can be **reimbursed** for the cost of improvements or other eligible expenses listed in the grant.

Previous grant awardees used the funds to purchase gardening tools, seeds, supplies for building garden beds, and more!
